Year One

English

Maths

We have also looked at balancing the scales against cubes, e.g. 1 lemon = 4 cubes. We have also thought about using the equals sign instead of writing 'the same as'.

Talking Point: Can you compare different items around your house using heavier than, lighter than and equal to?

Topic

In Geography this week we have been learning about oceans. We have looked at atlases to see where they are and labelled them on a world map.
